
## California Agriculture Garden

Fourth Grade Planting Lesson



#### **Objective**

Students will learn the significance of the roles that California's agriculture plays on a global scale, national, and within their daily lives.

#### **Standards**

#### History-Social Science

- 4.1 Students demonstrate an understanding of the physical and human geographic features that define places and regions in California.
  - 3. Identify the state capital and describe the various regions of California, including how their characteristics and physical environments (e.g., water, landforms, vegetation, climate) affect human activity.
  - 5. Use maps, charts, and pictures to describe how communities in California vary in land use, vegetation, wildlife, climate, population density, architecture, services, and transportation.

## Next Generation Science Standards 4-ESS2 Earth's Systems

4-ESS-2. Analyze and interpret data from maps to describe patterns of Earth's features.

#### **Materials**

Seedlings: Broccoli (hybrid, broccolini, stir fry), cauliflower (snowball) cabbage (cour di beu, hybrid)

Various seed varieties: carrots, lettuce, spinach(bloomsdale), chard (fardhook), peas(sugar snap peas), edible flowers.

Tasting (see below)

### Procedure - Tasting should be served prior to planting

#### A. Group Discussion (10 minutes)

- Ask students what they know about agriculture in CA. Agriculture is the
  process of growing plants or raising animals for use or consumption. The
  results are food and meat products that we eat. Cotton and leather for fabric and clothing. Wood for furniture, building materials and many products
  found in our homes.
- 2. Agriculture is the basis for every moment of our lives. All the things we eat, almost everything we wear, everything we sit on is a product of agriculture.
- 3. Agriculture is one of the leading industries in CA, and is also the number one farming state in the country.
- 4. CA's moderate weather is the main reason that we can grow crops year-round.
- The Central Valley of CA is known as the 'breadbasket' of the US which means it is the region that provides most of the food in the nation(HSS 4.1. & 4-ESS-2. Students will be presented with an agricultural map of California)
- 6. Different regions of CA produce different crops because of their diverse geography. (See CA Grows Map below)
  - a. Coastal regions (north, central and south)
  - b. Inland regions (north and south)
  - c. Valley and mountain regions
- 7. CA produces 99% of the following crops: almonds (world's largest producer), artichokes, dates, figs, kiwi, olives, pistachios (world's 2<sup>nd</sup> largest producer), pomegranates, raisins, prunes, and walnuts
- 8. Today we will be planting some of the vegetables that grow year-round in CA.

#### B. Small group activities (about 9 minutes at each activity)

- 1. Half of the students will journal.
- 2. The other half of the students will plant a CA Agriculture garden.

#### Conclusion

- 1. Agriculture supplies our daily lives in the food we eat, the clothes we wear, the products we use, and in furniture and buildings.
- 2. California is the most important agricultural state in the United States.
- The moderate weather in CA enables us to grow crops year-round, and the diverse geographic regions of the state make it possible to grow and produce a variety of foods.
